Contracting-Out Defeated by Science!

For the past six months, the Department of Corrections (DOC) was under orders by the Doyle Administration and Legislature to look at ways of saving money at its Central Pharmacy, Waupun Correctional Facility. The pharmacy needs of over 25,000 inmates are served out of this single site. Already an exemplary and highly efficient facility, that was not good enough: the DOC had to explore contracting-out options. Enter WSP.

Under the leadership of VP Gary Steffen, Science began efforts to challenge the validity of contracting-out. Numerous calls and meetings led to the formation of an ad hoc group consisting of AFT-W staff reps, pharmacists, and others. The real break-thru came in December 2005 when AFT-W President Andy Gussert brokered a meeting between Science representatives and Matt Frank, Secretary, DOC. VPs Gary Steffen and Roger Springman presented a policy fact sheet to Sec. Franks which highlighted the strengths of union pharmacists. DOC made it clear that they wanted to include Science in future discussions. Then, on January 20th, Sec. Franks announced that DOC would drop ALL attempts to contract-out pharmacists. This was a great victory for the WSP, AFT-W, and the pharmacists at DOC. Contracting-out can be fought, and won, with the right dedication and energy!! Need more information? WSP Goes to Court for its Members

Union employees can face a hostile environment in their local communities as well as in their workplaces. The Lakeland Times in Rhinelander has made it a habit to delve into the lives of DNR staff in the Rhinelander region. Last fall they sought some very specific salary and work performance information. While a substantial amount of that information was provided on non-union employees, the DNR pointed out that equivalent information on Science Professionals (and WPEC members) could NOT be given out because of privacy provisions within the contract. The DNR went out of its way to attempt a reasonable compromise, but the Lakeland Times had none of it and decided to take the DNR to court over its failure to release public employee information.

Both Science and WPEC made decisions to enter amicus briefs on behalf of the DNR's position in January. While believing in the importance of the public's right to know, we do not believe that the public has an unqualified right to obtain personal information and that it was incumbent on Science to defend contracted privacy protections. Fleet Arbitration Update

Last fall, Science began concerted efforts to collect case study information on the personal and business impacts of the State's imposed fleet guidelines. Using the SWAN network and personal appeals, nearly 40 cases were submitted for consideration and many of them were very powerful and persuasive. Not surprisingly, many members documented cases where the extreme loss of pool cars forced dramatic increases in personal car use in stark violation of original appointment letters. At the same

time, it is also very clear that fleet guidelines have profoundly affected the efficiency of employee work and led to numerous and unexpected effects on personal lives, (e.g. child care arrangements, need for another vehicle, higher insurance costs, driving "past" home to go to work for personal car pickup). Case development will continue over the next month with the expectation of a hearing this spring. Your Health Insurance Under Attack: Time to Get Serious !!

That long suspected day has arrived. The Legislature has found your health care benefits and they want to take them away. Cases in point: Two bills were introduced in the current session, AB 515 and AB 341, which could seriously erode the value and type of health insurance you receive. AB 515, even though aimed at municipal employees, could eventually affect state employees. It would strip away from the Municipal Employees Relation Act (MERA) the right of municipal employees to even bargain health insurance, allowing the employer to simply say plans are "equivalent" to current benefits. AB 341 is even worse because it is targeted at state employees. It would allow the State to adopt HSAs (Health Saving Accounts) that have high-deductible plans . . . and, if you haven't studied HSAs, they are largely a classic shell game and offer very little real insurance.

We understand the value of quality health insurance. Yet, you should no longer believe these benefits will remain secure. We must fight for what we believe in. With the aid of AFT-W and other organizations, a coalition is forming to help focus action and make sure an "early warning system" is established. Science must contribute to this effort too!
